SCIENCE AND ART IN THE KINDERGARTEN---BEETLEMANIA!

The fifteen Kindergarteners have also made use of the acorns covering the Calvin Hill playground. A group of Kindergarteners was very busy gathering and investigating weevil larvae from a large basket of acorns. Carefully using nutcrackers and protective goggles Selma, Eva, and Tasha demonstrated how they collect data on the weevils. The three demonstrated great enthusiasm and affection for their subjects. Eva offered several observations including, "Weevils have no legs. They grow into beetles. This is Stinky!"

Winnie opened the door to the fire escape to show a jar with three weevils. The Kindergarteners have carefully replicated the outside environment to see if the larvae will hatch into weevil beetles. The process takes approximately three weeks. The Kindergarteners even made dye from acorns!

The Kindergartners demonstrate impressive focus in all their observations. Claire examined a monarch's wing under the microscope, and Anna drew her impressions of a sculpture she had previously created. At another table, a group of illustrators worked on their books. The Kindergarteners have also been busy cooking and creating in the kitchen---corn-on-the-cob, salsa, and guacamole!
